Presidents Report February 2023

It has been another quiet month. The Board met with Coastal Credit Union and opened up the account. The transfer to Van City is almost done. We are keeping the Prospera account open until all the checks written in Dec and early Jan have been cleared. We have or will soon transfer the remaining monies to our new Van City account.

The Bingo is still going well and some of the super seniors who attend are willing to pay the admission fee, which will help Bingo move closer to a break-even position and the drop-in fee was enough to cover the rent. We have been contacted by a Board member at Glen Pine who is interested in setting up bingo at Glen Pine. I answered all of their questions.

We received a request from Glacier Media to place an ad in the seniors guide they are producing for the Tri-Cities. I said no as the cost was prohibitive. They then said they would list us in the guide, and asked what we would like to see in the listing. I don't know if they will list us this way, but I sent them the following:
